

## Useful websites for report writing

Websites can often be more appropriate resources than books for directing students towards to help develop their report writing. Report writing books tend to be too subject specific or focus on guidelines which relate to only one type of reports (technical, business, scientific). Report writing websites approach the topic more generally and in a way which encourages students to adapt and apply the principles to their own discipline.
